What surprised or caught your attention the most about working as a sailing instructor in the U.S.?

What surprised me the most was how kind people are in the U.S. Everyone in the club, from the parents to the kids and even the other instructors, treated me like family from the very first moment. The kindness and openness of people in this country was definitely something that stood out.

How was your experience teaching sailing in a different environment from your home country?

It was a big change, but it was exciting. The biggest challenge was adapting to different sailing conditions, particularly the wind and the tidal shifts, which were quite different from what I was used to back home. But teaching kids who were always eager to learn made the experience rewarding. The U.S. sailing culture is also unique because there's a lot of emphasis on having fun rather than just competing, which made the teaching environment very relaxed.

What challenges did you face, and how did you overcome them?

One of the challenges was teaching younger children who had very little experience on the water. I had to develop new ways of explaining things simply, and I had to be extra patient when the kids were nervous or scared.
