What surprised you the most about working as a sailing instructor in the U.S.?

What surprised me the most was how easy they made everything and how much they helped me adapt to my new job, not only my coworkers but also my students.

How was the experience of teaching sailing in a different environment from your home country?

I'm a returning instructor; last year, I was in Maine, and this year in Los Angeles. The first year was much harder for me to adapt because my English was limited, and I didn't know the nautical terms. Both experiences were equally good, but in the second one, I enjoyed it more right from the start.

What challenges did you encounter, and how did you overcome them?

In my first year, the biggest challenge was the language; I could barely understand what they were saying, and they couldn't understand me either. But after a week of studying every night, I got a handle on all the nautical expressions, and the students and I started to connect.

How has this experience influenced your career or personal growth?

Both experiences were different but amazing. In both, I've grown a lot as a person; now I know I can achieve anything I set my mind to, and my English has improved a lot.

Would you recommend this experience to other instructors? What would you tell them?

I'll just say that I'm planning to return next year. These were the two best summers of my life. I encourage everyone to step out of their comfort zone and take the leap—it's totally worth it.
